SCCA Solo Dixie Match Tour

The SCCA Match Tour made its second stop of its National Schedule at Spence Field in Moultrie, GA during the weekend of June $5 - 7^{th}$; a site known by local SCCA Dixie Region members for its grippy concrete surface and width that allows for more than a runway course, fun times and gnats. Lots and lots of gnats. But hey, concrete over gnats any day.

An event that at first struggled to meet the 120 entrants required to even happen soon grew to 134 drivers in 36 classes. The largest being the C Street (CS) class with 18 entrants and 61% of those entries were in The Twins also known as the Subaru BRZ and Scion FR-S. What is it about The Twins that has brought so many to that class let alone the Street Touring Extreme (STX) class which held its own Heat at Nationals in 2014 we may never know. Unless of course you own one.

The tire choice for the street classes (formerly stock) was a resounding Yes to the Bridgestone Re71r's which, according to several participants, had both the lateral and longitudinal bite needed to take on the course. SCCA Buccaneer Regional members Nelson Antunes and Christian Shipp decided to do a BFGoodrich/Bridgestone combination on their A Street (AS) '04 Corvette Zo6, self-titled the BFGoodStone, with 275/35 18 Bridgestone Re71r's on the front and 315/30 18 BFGoodrich g-Force Rival-S on the rear as the Re71r's did not come in the larger rear tire size. The result? Well, they had smiles on their faces and First and Second place trophy t-shirts (respectively, and Christian's first National Tour win) in their hands.





Yes, trophy t-shirts. It's been the rage in the SCCA National Tours for some time now. Wear them with pride guys and skeletons alike as STF winner Michael May of the Dixie Region gave his passenger seat companion Earl his winning t-shirt for his continued efforts of encouraging May on course.

For those who aren't in the know and truly I wasn't before I went either, the Match Tour format is as follows:

Day 1: Competitors take three runs in the morning followed by three runs in the afternoon in their individual classes with no course change. The winners of each class are presented with their trophies at the end of the day.

Day 2: Competitors return for three more runs on the same course but this time drivers are fighting for the top 16 PAX positions in each Heat. The first eight PAX positions of each Heat move on to the Super Shootout, the next eight to the Club Shootout. For those of us who just aren't PAX-y enough to qualify there is the Bonus Shootout where you enter a raffle ticket into a drawing to be one of 8 drivers – I was lucky enough to be drawn in my '91 Honda Civic which competes in Street Modified FWD (SMF) against Joe Casper in his '03 Mitsubishi Evo in Street Modified (SM). Yippee? The winners from the Shootout Challenges are the winners of Day 2 and get, of course, a t-shirt and champagne but since its' the Dixie Region – moonshine. I'm just thinking it doesn't spray the same but I bet the flame it can make is way cooler.



How the Shootout Works:

It's a bracket not a racket. The Super and Club Shootout drivers from each Heat take two runs each in pairs, PI vs P2, P3 vs P4, and so on to try to either match their dial-in time - yes think Drag Racing but there is a difference so read on - or beat that time. The dial-in time is the fastest raw (scratch) time from your 3 runs that morning. Never more did my saying of, "If I can run it dirty I can run it clean" come into play because my fastest was my dirtiest of the weekend. If you can beat that time, which I didn't, then you better be ready to back it up because that becomes your new dial-in time. If both drivers beat their dial-in time the one who did it best (went faster than their fastest) wins the first round. If they don't then the one nearest to their dial-in time or beats their dial-in time advances. Once all sets of drivers have run, the winners then go into the Single Run elimination rounds.

Breathe. I am almost done explaining. And if you need some, the aspirin is right over there.

Once each Heat has eliminated to single drivers for First through Third place (although in this case we only ran for first place) then the battle begins for the two heats to take on each other to determine the final Shootout Winners.

Sound like fun? It was but first I had to handle my nerves. Everyone told me, it's just like fun runs. All you have to do is try to match or beat your own time. Ha! As any of us know nothing in racing is easy. There is always an angle, a plan, a way to win and for this format of autocrossing it is no different. When I came back from my second run my friend Marko Horn, Dixie Region EP driver and also Club Shootout contestant, was yelling (he's German, they aren't really yelling it just sounds like it) that all I needed to do on my second run was keep it clean – I hadn't. Didn't I see all the cones the Mitsu was hitting on his run?! Wait. What? I was supposed to watch for that? I was supposed to have a game plan?

When I got to the line all I did was close my eyes and say, "All I am is home. I can do this." I'd open my eyes and everything "National" went away. Foot to pedal and off I went. After the times were audited I was determined the winner, his faster time was good but the evil cones with their 2 second penalty each took the win away. Off to Round 2. More pressure. Fantastic. Now remember, it is just you against yourself. Hasn't anyone ever heard you are your own worst enemy? No. Come on! I got up to the line, took a breath, told myself I was home and just drive as thought of keeping it clean may advance me to the next round. While I kept it clean my next competitor did as well and did it faster, no advancement for me but I did congratulate him.

After it was all said and done I can tell you that I absolutely loved the adrenaline rush. I loved that I felt like I was in Vegas with everything in, waiting on the river card to flip. I want this rush again and if I have the chance I will but like anything else there are some Pros and Cons to this.

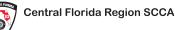
Pros: \$80 and at least 9 runs. For the Shootout the hosting region works the course.

Cons: You have to be fast enough to get in or lucky enough to win the lottery pull. Long work sessions. PAX isn't always great when you are in a Modified or Prepared class unless your CFR member and 2 time National back-toback F Mod Champion Darren Seltzer.

But still.... Many thanks to the SCCA Dixie Region who also hosts the inaugural SCCA National Tour, "The Road to Lincoln." They are a great region to run with and well worth the drive from Florida if you ever get the opportunity to do so.

John Greenwood, 70, of Altamonte Springs, Florida, passed away July 07, 2015. John was born April 5, 1945 in Lafayette, IN. John now resides with his Mother (Betty) and Father (Hank), and younger siblings Mark and Jean too, who preceded him home. He is survived by his loving sons Tim (Sandi) Greenwood of Sorrento, FL. and their twins Sarah and Cydney; Joe (Edye) Greenwood of Apopka, FL and their children Logan and Mallory. John is also survived, and missed, by his sisters; Lesley West of Denver, CO; Chris Couture of Phoenix, AZ; Mary Greenwood of Dawsonville, GA and his brother Burt Greenwood of Altamonte Springs, FL. Long respected for his racing the patriotic Greenwood Corvettes through the 1970's at Daytona, Sebring, LeMans and many other racetracks that are legend with enthusiasts. John Greenwood

The son of a GM executive. John Greenwood began drag racing as a teenager on Detroit's famed Woodward Avenue strip. A few years later, he caught the road racing bug after entering his new 1968 Corvette in a parking lot Solo event. That was enough. When he took his big block Corvette to Waterford Hills it marked the start of a remarkable career in SCCA and IMSA, a full blown race shop, a sponsorship program with

the BF Goodrich Tire Company, a thriving cars and parts business, and three trips to the 24 hour race at Le Mans, France.

In 1970 and 1971 John qualified for the SCCA runoffs winning the A-Production National championship two years in a row. John's initial paintwork evolved into the signature "Stars and Stripes" theme, variations of which are seen on many Corvettes to this day. His stars and stripes might have also inspired the "Rebel" paint job on the Corvette of racing rivals Dave Heinz and Or Costanzo.



John caught the attention of Frank Cipelli at Michigan International Speedway who helped make the deal with BFGoodrich that launched John and his brother Burt into the big leagues. Using this contract as leverage, John built Corvettes configured for FIA endurance racing. His co-drivers at the 24 hours of Daytona and the 12 Hours of Sebring include famed comedian Dick Smothers (1971 GT Sebring winners),

Don Yenko, Bob Johnson, Tony Adamowicz, Ron Grable, Allan Barker, Dick Lang, Gib Hufstader, Mike Brockman, Jim Greendyke and his brother Burt.

The deal with BFGoodrich also gave Greenwood's team the backing to race two Corvettes at Le Mans in 1972 and 1973. It put him on the map although none managed to finish the 24 hour race.

1974 brought along anti-pollution mandates, higher insurance costs and the mid-east oil embargo. It would take years for technology to rescue the

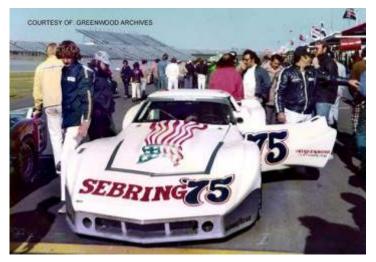


manufacture of high performance automobiles but that did not stop Greenwood.

He relied upon connections with chassis and suspension expert Bob Riley, and with GM designer Randy Wittine to create the first wide-body Corvette. Since GM had renounced racing, it fell to Greenwood to develop his cars with continued support and parts from an "underground" network spearheaded by Gib Hufstader.

Greenwood's wide-bodies became American fan favorites, challenging the factory-supported customer teams of Porsches and BMWs that held a grip on GT racing John Bishop's growing IMSA series.

The Sebring 12 hour race was also victimized by the times in 1974, forced to cancel by a national recession and jacked up fuel prices which put a damper on consumer spending. That left the organizers short of money to pay for track safety improvements mandated by the FIA. When it looked like the 1975 Sebring event was also imperiled, John Greenwood stepped up to promote the 23rd and 24th 12 hours of Sebring, saving the historic race from possible extinction.



Racing in Europe was also affected. So, in 1976, the Le Mans organizers invited Greenwood and his "rompin-stompin" American V8s to bring out the crowds. John negotiated a stellar deal. It mattered less that race results were disappointing as fans turned out in droves which pleased the ACO organizers. In truth, Greenwood actually entered a car borrowed from Rick Mancuso because the time it would take to change over his own cars to comply with new suspension rules made it easier to work with one of his customer cars.



Trans Am allowed full tube frame cars for 1977. Collaborating again with Bob Riley, Greenwood fielded a newly designed tube frame chassis Corvette. Only two of these tube frames were built. John premiered #77 at Brainerd where it was promptly dubbed the Batmobile. It appeared just three times before being sold to Jerry Hansen and then to Greg Pickett who won the TA championship in 1978.

At this juncture, independent constructors found themselves forced out by Porsche, Audi, and BMW factory supported customer teams. John carried on his racing efforts with variants on some of his earlier customer cars while turning his efforts to "street" applications. John still dabbled in the Playboy Escort Endurance Series, the 1988 Corvette Challenge Series, and the IMSA Supercar series but by then his racing program had had its day.

Two and a half decades onward, the legacy carved by Greenwood lives on. Greenwood cars and cars with Greenwood parts are a favorite in vintage racing and are highly prized by collectors worldwide.

Greenwood expert Wayne Ellwood was instrumental in preparing this brief historical account.

After their terrible showing at Daytona in 1969, factory Porsche was determined to win at Sebring with five Porsche 908s entered and some of the best endurance drivers hired to drive them.

Many thought that with that many factory cars entered Porsche would surely win but the racing gods thought otherwise as the Porsches began to succumb to the notoriously rough Sebring circuit. At one point the factory Ferrari 312P of Chris Amon and Mario Andretti held the lead but overheating began to plague them. Finally the steady diving of Jacky Ickx and Jackie Oliver (also known as the "pair of Jacks") brought their aging Gulf Ford GT40 up the ranks to take the overall win with the Amon/Andretti Ferrari very close behind.



The starting grid for the last Le Mans style start at Sebring with the factory 312P on the pole and the Penske Lola second. After the race the Lola would be stolen when the Penske crew stopped in Ormond Beach while on the way back to the shops in Philadelphia. This prevented Penske from entering the car at Le Mans in 1969.





The Penske Lola T70 Mk.3B of Mark Donohue and Ronnie Bucknum about to enter the esses. This car won at Daytona in 1969 but the rough Sebring circuit resulted in a DNF for the Lola.



The highest placing Porsche at Sebring in 1969 was this third place 908/02 of Rolf Stommelen, Joe Buzzetta and Kurt Ahrens, Jr.



The beautifully painted Lola T70 Mk.3B of Ulf Norinder and Jo Bonnier broke a radius arm mounting and had to retire. Sebring was notoriously rough in those days.





The winning Gulf Ford GT 40 of Jacky lckx and Jackie Oliver. This same car won at Le Mans in 1968 and would go on, after winning Sebring in '69, to win at Le Mans again. It is considered one of the most celebrated race cars in motorsports history.



At one time this factory Ferrari 312P of Chris Amon and Mario Andretti led the race but overheating resulted in them getting a very close second place finish but first in class.



The Porsche 906 of Mike Rahal, Bill Stroh and Hugh Wise lost a wheel during the race and had to retire.

Overheating plagued the factory Alfa Romeo T33/3 of Andrea de Adamich and Mario Casoni and they failed to finish.

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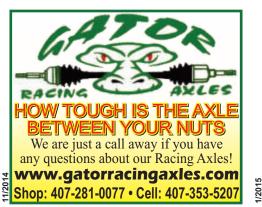
